More `GOINGS-ON' At The Factory

We are thrilled to report that the people from Yoxall in Staffordshire who copied our bird sculptures, "WILD EYE DEARS" of Fox's End, Lucepool Lane Yoxall, Staffs, pleaded guilty at the Court and were fined 1,000 pounds per design that they had copied, plus 2,500 pounds in Court costs, making a total fine of 17,500 pounds. This had to be paid by the Directors within three months from the court case conviction.

We are extremely happy that we won the case, as is Trading Standards in Chester, who prosecuted the company. We sincerely hope that now that we have successfully prosecuted these fraudsters, that anyone else, (of whom there are still many), will think very carefully before embarking on another copying business!

We are absolutely committed to Stopping anyone who tries to pass off copies of our sculptures as theirs, and will leave no stone unturned until they have been stopped, no matter how costly or invasive the resulting investigation is !!

We have spent hundreds of pounds on Private Detectives and hotels when doing `stakeouts', waiting for the forgers to turn up with deliveries at garden centres and other outlets. We have hidden in hedges with camera equipment in the rain. We have followed cars for miles & miles trying to locate manufacturing bases from which the copiers were working.

The copies are sold at a quarter of the price we sell them for, and we have lost thousands of pounds through this illegal activity. We have had eight years of sleuthing, and are now so good at it that we are thinking of offering our services as as detectives. Watch out Miss Marple and Hercule Pirot !!!



"ROBERT BURNS THE POET"

Verse 5

We are about to start a model of Robbie Burns, the famous Scottish Poet & song writer. He was arguably the greatest literary figure and a poet of the people!

Robbie Burns was born on 25 Jan 1759 into miserable poverty. His parents had a farm & Robert was put to work from a very early age, and by 15 he was the chief Laborer. The harsh life took its toll on him. Food was very scarce, life was very hard, and Burns suffered very badly. However, his father sent him to a good school, and he gained a good grounding in Latin, French, Greek, English Literature, & trigonometry. His mother was largely uneducated, but Burns, nevertheless, imbibed from her a great love for the rich tradition of Scottish balladry.

Despite the desperate hardship of the farm, Burns always had a small volume of Scottish ballads in his pocket. He was taking in the tradition & memories of his country. Whilst he was working on the land, he developed a day to day account of all the small events that happened in the lowland fields, and this came out in his poetry. He had great a sympathy with the creatures of the fields, and with the poor people, and many of his poems reflect this.

Here is an extract from a famous poem which was composed after Burns had disturbed a mouse's nest with his plough. (remember, this will have been a hand plough, & he would have been walking & been able to see the earth very closely).

TO A MOUSE, ON TURNING HER UP IN HER NEST WITH THE PLOGH" - November 1785

Verse 1

Wee Sleekit, Cow'rin', Tim'Rous Beastie, What A Panic's In Thy Brestie! Thou Need Na Start Awa Sae Hasty, Wi' Bickering Brattle! I Wad Be Laith To Rin An' Chase Thee Wi' Murd'Ring Pattle!

Thou Saw The Fields Laid Bare And Waste
An' Weary Winter Comin' Fast,
An' Cozie Here, Beneath The Blast
Thou Thought To Dwell
Till Crash! The Cruel Coulter Past
Out - Thro' Thy Cell.

Verse 6

That Wee Bit Heap O' Leaves An Stibble
Has Cost Thee Mony A Weary Nibble!
But House or Hald,
To Thole The Winter's Sleety Dribble,
An' Cranreuch Cauld!

Verse 7

But Mousie, Thou Art No Thy Lane, In Proving Forsight May Be Vain, The Best Laid Schemes O' Mice An' Men Gaft Aft A-Gley An Lea'e Us Nought But Grief An' Pain For Promise'D Joy.

Verse 8 (last verse)

Still Thou Art Blest Compar'D Wi' Me!
The Present Only Toucheth Thee:
But Oh! I Backward Cast My E'E
On Prospects Drear!
An' Forward Tho I Canna See,
I Guess An' Fear!

ROBBIE BURNS (continued)....

Burns first poems were published in 1768 under the title: `Poems Chiefly in the Scottish Dialect'. He was one of the most fascinating human beings on record! Today the whole world is aware of this, and indeed in his own lifetime, many of his own acquaintances became aware that they were with a very special person!


Burns died in 1796 at an early age from endocarditis, which is an inflammation of the internal lining of the heart. This was a direct result of the cruel strains on his youthful constitution .caused by his early hard life.

Burns' sympathy with the workers and poor people, and to the beasts of the field has made him `A Poet of the People'!

He is held dear by all Scottish people wherever they live, and indeed by all races of literary minded people.

We think it is an excellent idea to sculpt his likeness and to make other people aware of his poetry & songs.

Does anybody know the famous song:
Auld Lang Sine ?
Of course you do!
It was written by Robbie Burns!!

The Seafarer is a good addition to our nautical characters and is undergoing painting trials and should be in production as this newsletter reaches you. It was presented at the Spring Gift fair at the N.E.C. IN Birmingham in Feb 1998. This model is portrayed wearing a knitted Polo neck Jumper and knitted woollen hat. He has a beard and pipe. He comes in yellow Ochre and brown or for the collectors we have a light grey and crimson red model.
